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### FY 2021 BOARD PRIORITIES AND PRINCIPLES

Salem Area Mass Transit District, also known as Cherriots, has established priorities and principles that board members can use when representing the District on external committees.

# Cherriots Board of Directors adopts the following priorities and principles:

# Support of increased public transit funding

While Cherriots has seen an expansion of service in recent years, noticeable gaps in frequency and coverage remain in the existing service. As such, we are supportive of initiatives that could support the expansion of public transit in Marion and Polk counties. Funding sources could include federal, state, or local (city and county) revenues.

### Pedestrian and bicyclist infrastructure

Transit riders and other community members depend on a strong, multi-modal network to reach their destinations. Large sections of the urban growth boundary do not have sidewalks, and bike infrastructure is inadequate. As Cherriots becomes a mobility integrator, we must advocate for strong "first mile/last mile" infrastructure.

#### **Environmental justice**

Decisions on how to allocate resources should be viewed through a lens of environmental justice. New projects should always consider historically underserved communities. For example, an area with higher levels of pollution should be the first to receive funding targeted to mitigate pollution.

# Maintenance of existing travel lanes before building new infrastructure

Allocation of funding for automobile travel lanes should prioritize the maintenance of existing infrastructure before building new, costly-to-maintain infrastructure.

# **Unaccounted costs**

Attention should be paid to policies that put the burden of costly infrastructure on the public when the number of individuals who would benefit is nominal. For example, parking minimums increase the cost of housing and commercial properties for everyone, but only drivers of automobiles benefit.

- Virtual and Hybrid Meetings: The Board of Directors meeting is a public meeting that is typically held in the Senator Hearing Room at Courthouse Square where it is ADA- accessible. ## I. INFORMATION ITEMS

1. Update on the South Salem Transit Center Project

Staff Report:Pages 49-56 in the agenda and a PowerPoint presentationPresenter:Steve Dickey, Director of Program Management & TechnologyRyan Farncomb, Project Lead for Parametrix

Project Lead Ryan Farncomb briefed the Board on the first phase of the South Salem Transit Center project. There were monthly project management meetings, reviewing existing land use, transportation and transit plans, and a market segmentation analysis.

CHERRIOTS

Farncomb reported on the next steps toward selecting a site. He reviewed nine tasks that would complete the 18 month project. As of June 9, 2021, the project was on schedule and within budget. To date, \$102,374.09 had been expended.

Parametrix conducted a survey in April/May 2021 that was sent to a random sample of 7,000 households, as well as Cherriots mailing lists (3900 other emails). Half of the respondents (49 percent) said that Cherriots meets their travel needs. Respondents ranked the top three priorities for improving Cherriots service as (1) having the bus come more often, (2) having the bus stop closer to them, and (3) having the bus reach their destination faster. Respondents said that the most important destinations they would like to be able to ride Cherriots to and from are errands and shopping (76 percent), medical needs (50 percent), and recreational activities (48 percent). Other popular options included commuting to or from work (38 percent) and visiting family or friends (34 percent). Three-quarters of respondents (74 percent) felt positive about the new transit center. Half of all respondents (49 percent) said they felt very positive; 10 percent of respondents felt negative about the new transit center. Respondents would like to see station amenities (86 percent), restrooms (77 percent), and park and ride spaces (56 percent). Purchasing food and beverages was the fourth most-chosen amenity overall (42 percent) but was especially popular among Cherriots users (50 percent of users chose it).

Farncomb reported that the best locations for a site, per zoning, were along Commercial and Liberty. Zoning determines where the South Salem Transit Center mobility hub (SSTCMH) can be sited. Commercial and higher-density residential is concentrated along Commercial Street SE, Kuebler Boulevard, and Liberty Road SE. Route 21 provides a fast trip with a short wait into downtown. Most of local south Salem is reachable with Routes 8, 18 and 6, which all serve stops near Commercial and Baxter. Sidewalks and bicycle facilities were prevalent throughout the study area, facilitating non-motorized access to major transportation corridors. Significant employment and population growth is forecast in and around the study area. Much of the growth is expected on large vacant sites, both on the urban periphery and places such as the Fairview Training Center redevelopment site. An example of future network improvements was provided based on Parametrix findings in the Long Range Transit Plan process. Operating costs were estimated at approximately \$2 million per year.

There was time for questions and answers. Staff will provide demographic information at the board's request. As the Salem planning staff updates the zoning code, District staff will have opportunity to discuss where a transit center will be allowed. At this stage of the



process, the District is trying to determine the size of and access to property for the project. Amenities like signage and drinking fountains will come later.

### I. GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

**CHERRIOTS** 

GM Pollock expressed his appreciation to Directors Krebs and Busch for their years of service while on the Board representing the District. He announced that the Customer Service Center will open again on June 28 for customers to purchase their bus passes. Fares will be reinstated on July 6. District offices will be closed and there will be no bus service on July 5 in recognition of the Independence Day holiday. GM Pollock reported that the Rules Advisory Committee (RAC) for the Statewide Transportation Improvement Fund and Special Transportation Fund merge will meet for the first time next week. The RAC has six months to develop and provide their recommendations to the Oregon Transportation Commission. Cherriots joined the FTA Sustainable Transit for a Healthy Planet Challenge as a participant. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Sustainable Transit for a Healthy Planet Challenge encourages transit agencies to take bold actions and investments to cut Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions. Throughout the next year, FTA staff will provide technical assistance to agencies that commit to developing climate action plans or other strategies. GM Pollock will provide updates along the way.

### J. BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORTS

Director Nguyen reported that consultants, Keen Independent Research, are doing oneon-one interviews for the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee project. Director Nguyen spoke about ways to provide world class customer service, in reference to the South Salem Transit Center project, and in her recent travels to Tokyo, Japan where they were able to construct solar panels on the top of bus stops as a protection against the environment and all the while collecting heat to radiate to the seating area during the night or in bad weather for people waiting to catch the bus.

Director Busch shared her appreciation for the numerous people she worked with as a member of the Board. She spoke about several memorable events and praised people for their hard work and dedication to public transportation. She announced that moving forward, she will serve as a Director on the Keizer Fire District Board. She also provided a written report of her board activities for June.

Director Hinojos Pressey reviewed highlights from the minutes of the June 15 Citizens Advisory Committee meeting for which she serves as a Board Liaison. She noted that the next meeting is September 21.

CHERRIOTS

Director Carney reported on the June 9 zoning subcommittee meeting of the Our Salem project. The next meeting will be July 15 from 3-5 p.m. She attended the Salem-Keizer Area Transportation (SKATS) Policy Committee meeting where they discussed two amendments; one for a reduction in the length of a project corridor and one for the removal of the Wheatfield Ferry project in the current Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP). They also discussed the Oregon Metropolitan Planning Organization Consortium's (OMPOC) legislative priorities and ODOTs enhanced projects. She noted that the Salem-Keizer School Board was added by SKATS as a signatory member in the cooperative agreements. It was something that had been overlooked a long time ago that was rectified.

President Davidson reported that the City of Salem's Climate Action Plan Task Force met June 23 to refine the Proposed Strategies for the Salem Climate Action Plan (https://www.cityofsalem.net/CityDocuments/ClimateActionPlan\_DraftStrategies\_v13.pdf). The key take away for him from that meeting was the recognition of the importance of transportation and the steps that will be taken to address that. He is excited for the role that Cherriots can take in that. One of the things he really pushed for was a "spine" of protected corridors for bike lanes. President Davidson also reported on the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments board meeting where the COG budget was approved, and the June 3 meeting for the Mid-Willamette Valley Area Commission on Transportation (MWACT) where they discussed corrections to discrepancies in the population forecast and the impacts. The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) completed the Active Transportation Needs Inventory (ATNI) project. The inventory included sidewalks, bicycle lanes and shoulders along state highways. A letter from the transit board to the Oregon Transportation Commission (OTC) and the efforts of others regarding the division of funding for future plans resulted in increased funding for Active Transportation that includes public transportation. ODOT will review the ATNI and how it will be used to identify projects and priorities for future STIP projects.

Director Krebs shared his appreciation and thanks for his fellow board members, staff and agencies he worked during his tenure on the Board. Director Krebs announced that he will volunteer his time on a streetcar committee for Salem on the railroad bridge to West Salem. It has nothing to do with a third bridge. It is a transit-oriented thing to increase economic development and provide mobility for the Salem community. Director Krebs is a streetcar advocate and is very excited about it. He also provided a written report of his activities for the month of June.

Director Richards reported that 2020-2021 has been a very good year for senior citizens. He has worked with Northwest Senior Services for a long time and in this case, sometimes



a bad situation turns into a better situation. That is exactly what happened because of the fires and the effects of COVID-19. An unusually large amount of funding was granted to the senior population who will be taken care of a lot better in the next several years.

## ISSUE

Shall the Board accept the FY2021 preliminary year-end financial report?

## **BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS**

The District's fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. Oregon Revised Statutes – ORS 267.140(5) – requires the District to make a financial report for the previous year available to its Board within 30 days of fiscal year end. To comply with the timeframe established by the State of Oregon, District staff prepared a report providing preliminary results. Audited reports will be prepared when the independent audit work has been completed.

The preliminary report includes statements for the General Fund, Transportation Programs Fund, and the Capital Project Fund. These statements compare the budget amounts to actual amounts by legal appropriations category. Because this is an early preliminary look at FY21, some transactions and adjustments have not yet been made, so they are not included in this preliminary report. These items include depreciation of assets, year-end revenue accruals, and various expense adjustments.

### General Fund Revenues:

General Fund Total Operating Revenues are at 97% of budget.

Total Federal Funding is currently at 81.9% the annual budget, but will increase by a revenue accrual for the fourth quarter.

Miscellaneous revenues have performed better than expected, at 212% of annual budget, due to the sales of various assets sold this year.

### General Fund Expenditures:

The Total Operating expenditures of the General Fund are under budget at 89% of total annual budget. All divisions in the General Fund are below the annual budget, ranging from 61% to 96% of annual budget.

### Transportation Programs Fund Revenues:

Transportation Total Revenues are at 63% of budget.

Statewide Transportation Improvement Fund (STIF) Formula, STIF Pass-Through Formula Funds, and Special Transportation Fund (STF) Pass-Through Funds categories are at 114%, 134%, and 100% of annual budget, respectively.

Federal Funds, including CARES Act funding in FY21 are behind the annual budget. This is expected because we must incur the expenses prior to requesting a drawdown from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Fourth quarter drawdowns will be accrued when the calculations are complete.

DD53 Revenues in FY21 are at 6% of the annual budget. The pandemic has hit this revenue source much harder than anticipated. Sheltered workshops where many of the DD53 riders work remained shut down for most of FY21. A few of the DD53 independent workers have returned to private work sites which reflects the payments we have received.

## Transportation Programs Fund Expenditures:

The Total Transportation Programs Fund expenditures are below budget, ranging from 38% to 79%.

## \* Capital Projects Fund Revenues and Expenditures:

Overall, the Capital Project Fund has received and expended about 17% of the appropriated budget. As with the other fund statements, reimbursement requests are in process and the revenues will be reported with the audited report.

Many of the planned FY21 capital projects were impacted by the pandemic, which created delays in schedules. These have been carried forward to the Adopted FY2021-22 budget year to be completed.

## ISSUE

Shall the Board accept the Final Recommendation Report for the Salem to Albany Corridor Feasibility Study?

# **BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS**

The district received a grant through the Statewide Transportation Improvement Fund (STIF) Discretionary grant program in 2019 to study the feasibility of a transit route between the cities of Salem and Albany. The City of Albany and Albany Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (AAMPO) have been working with the District for the last 10 months to study alternatives for service types, routing, and possible funding options. Jarrett Walker and Associates, a transit planning consulting firm, was hired to lead the planning effort and has produced a final recommendation report, which is provided in **Attachment A**. They will be delivering the presentation on the project at tonight's meeting.

The cities of Salem and Albany are not linked by low-cost public transit. Currently, the only options are Amtrak or the Cascades POINT bus, which are four to six times as expensive as the current Cherriots Regional fare. There is no transit service in the small towns between Salem and Albany (Jefferson and Millersburg), which are bypassed by Amtrak and POINT. The District's Coordinated Plan identified an affordable connection with Albany as a high priority for further study. While connecting the two urban areas was the focus of this study, service among the smaller communities of Jefferson and Millersburg was also considered.

Historically, regional transit service funding has flowed from the state to counties, and the Marion and Linn County boundary lines have been barriers to providing service

across those lines in towns like Jefferson. However, with the introduction of new statewide transportation improvement funds in 2018, raised through a payroll tax, these administrative barriers are being erased. Transit service can now be studied and potentially funded on a larger, region-wide basis instead of county by county.

Public transit service is available throughout the smaller towns of Marion and Polk counties, connecting to Salem as well as to Wilsonville, McMinnville, Portland, and the coast. Riders can access other transportation services via regional public transit service, such as Woodburn Transit, the Silverton Silver Trolley, Canby Area Transit, Wilsonville SMART, Tillamook County Transportation District and Yamhill County Transit. These regional services are used by people traveling for work, for study, to visit friends or family, to access medical services, for shopping, and more. Thanks to collaboration among many of the regional providers, these services also let people travel longer distances across the state, for a reasonable price and sometimes with short and easy connections between routes. Connecting downtown Salem with downtown Albany would also create a link between other regional providers.

For example, the Tillamook County Transportation District operates the Coastal Connector transit service between Lincoln City and Salem. Currently, people trying to get from Albany to Lincoln City have to go through Corvallis and Newport, but the connection via Salem would be much shorter. This is also true for all points north of Salem including McMinnville, Newberg, and the greater Portland Metro area.

District staff, the City of Albany, and the AAMPO would like to add one more link to that network, with the addition of a Salem-Albany service. In any network, each additional link multiplies the value of all other links. A Salem-Albany route would be useful to people traveling between those cities, but because it is part of a larger statewide network it also increases the usefulness of routes between Salem and Wilsonville, for example, or between Albany and Corvallis.

## **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

There is no financial impact.

## ISSUE

Shall the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a contact with Jacobs Engineering Group, Inc. for the development of the 2043 Long-Range Transit Plan (LRTP) project for a not-to-exceed amount of \$225,000?

# **BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS**

The 2043 LRTP will be a comprehensive long-range (20-year) planning document that provides a road map for transit and other mobility options in the District's service area (local and regional). A strong public transit system is the backbone of environmentally friendly and economically thriving communities. The Districts vision, mission, and values represent the guiding principles for long-range transit planning. The objective of the project is to create a 20-year LRTP for the Cherriots Local and Regional networks by October 31, 2022.

A clear guidebook for planning Cherriots services for the next 20 years has never existed for the District. This has meant that long-range planning was only as certain as documented in some shorter term planning documents (3-5 years). The LRTP will allow the District to plan effectively over a 20-year period and will give staff something to reference when making long-term investment decisions.

Cherriots issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to hire a transportation planning consultant to develop a LRTP in February, 2021. Four (4) qualified proposals were received and evaluated by a selection committee in April, with a final decision made in June, 2021. Jacobs Engineering Group, Inc. scored the highest of the proposers and was the lowest cost bidder on the proposal.

The LRTP project will include several key elements, but is not limited to the following deliverables:

- An analysis of existing conditions based on the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) data for Marion and Polk counties.
- Planning of service standards and policies, community development, transit demand, traffic congestion, greenhouse gas reduction, gap analysis, new technologies, and service development.
- Alternatives for 5-, 10-, and 20-year time horizons based on the regional travel demand forecasting (SKATS) model and Transit Boardings Estimation Simulation Tool (TBEST) model runs. Two or three additional runs of the SKATS model are included in the scope to test future transit networks, which will be done by SKATS.
- Planning for future technological and public transit innovations such as microtransit along the Kuebler Boulevard corridor in south and southeast Salem.
- Planning future facilities that support service operations for a diverse range of modes that could form the infrastructure to support mode choices other than personal automobile transportation. Examples include first-mile, last-mile solutions such as bike-share, scooter-share, and car-share services that link to transit.
- A report that recommends an initial priority listing of requirements growing out of the LRTP that will guide short-term capital investments and changes in operations.
- A public engagement survey in tandem with online or in-person events that enables the public who may not be able to attend any of our events to give feedback on the document.

Draft and final Long-Range Transit Plans: publication and distribution of a regionally coordinated and board-approved long-range plan in high quality, book-bound format with color graphic illustrations, as appropriate, to adequately convey the established vision. A digital version will be made available on Cherriots.org and the Cherriots intranet (Portal).

### ISSUE

Shall the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a contract with DePaul Industries, The DPI Group, for security services (unarmed) to begin in August 2021, for a not-to-exceed amount of \$220,000?

### **BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS**

To ensure the delivery of a world-class customer experience for all employees, riders, and the general public, the District monitors conduct on all its vehicles and facilities. This is accomplished at the Keizer and Downtown transit centers through an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Salem's police department and a contract with Allied Universal Security Services, a private security provider.

The Del Webb Operations Headquarters is home to the entire Operations Division which includes the following departments: Transportation (Transit Operators, Operations Supervisors, and Support Staff), Maintenance (Journey Mechanics, Service Technicians, Service Workers, and Facilities Maintenance Workers, and Maintenance Supervisors), and Contracted Services (Cherriots Call Center, and other staff). The Operations Headquarters holds a significant number of physical assets, including the fixed route vehicles, non-revenue (staff cars) vehicles, and all associated technology equipment vital to the operations of the service.

Over the past several years, the number of incidents at the Operations Headquarters has increased dramatically—the most significant concern is the increased number of unauthorized individuals who have accessed the property through open, unattended gates. Once on the property, trespassers have been witnessed tampering with employee and staff vehicles, entering District buses, and entering the maintenance shop unannounced. These activities

present a high risk to the personal safety of our employees, as well as the risk of damage or loss of staff and District assets.

A capital project has been included in the FY 22 budget to harden the perimeter of the Operations Headquarters by constructing automated gates and improved fencing. Closing the perimeter will greatly reduce risk and enhance security at the facility; however, as with any construction project, the gate and fence upgrades will take time to implement.

Due to the high risk to safety and potential for loss, the likelihood that unauthorized persons will continue to enter the property, and the possible severity of an incident, the District must take action to mitigate the risk by implementing an interim security solution.

DePaul Industries, The DPI Group, has a Qualified Rehabilitation Facility (QRF) Price Agreement for Security Services with the State of Oregon. Under ORS 279.850(1), when utilizing general funds or state funds, and when there is no contribution from a federal source, SAMTD is required to utilize a QRF without open competition.

The term of the Contract is from August 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022. Security staff will be present onsite 24 hours per day, seven (7) days per week.

The partnership between District staff, the private security provider at the transit centers, the City of Salem Police Department, and The DPI Group helps Cherriots deliver on its mission of safety through security presence and responsiveness.

## **FINANCIAL IMPACT**

Funding for this contract amount is included in the FY2021-2022 Deputy General Manager Division, Security and Emergency Management Department General Fund budget. The term of the contract does not exceed the current fiscal year.

Total contract cost for FY2021-22 is not-to-exceed \$220,000.

## RECOMMENDATION
